The Death of The World's Last Pink Diamond Mine

Historically, few, if any, diamond mines have been as productive as the Rio Tinto Argyle mine in western Australia. Since 1983, the mine, which is located in the country's East Kimberley region, has produced more than 800 million carats of rough diamonds and is the largest supplier of natural colored diamonds.

Sadly, the Rio Tinto Argyle mine is scheduled to close within the next five years. There will no longer be any remaining diamonds to mine. Some experts project it will shut down as early as 2018, while others feel it will be later. All, however, seem to be in agreement that a full closure will take place by 2020.

This has led to an incredible spike in demand for pink diamonds, which were already extremely rare and valuable. In general, the demand for colored diamonds is expected to exceed supply by 2018, but for pink diamonds, which are essentially on the verge of extinction, their value is estimated to increase by as much as 2,000% in the near future.

The Rio Tinto Argyle mine dramatically changed the diamond industry when it opened 22 years ago, and it is sure to do the same when it closes.
